

### Retroactive Denial of Coverage

Dental plans have the ability to review claims *after* payment has been delivered to dentists and request claim payment refunds under certain circumstances. The laws below restrict the timeframe in which insurers are allowed to request such a refund. #### 2021 STATE LEGISLATION – TIME LIMITS ON INSURER TO RECOVER OVERPAYMENT

**(\*) Statute:** Time limitations vary for unique types of transactions such as Coordination of Benefits and Publicly Funded Programs. Transactions where fraud or duplicate payments from the same insurer may not have time limitations.

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
