Gehani, chair, called a meeting of the Council on Dental Education and 7 Licensure to order on Tuesday, August 20, 2019 at 5:30 p.m. via teleconference call. 8 9 Roll Call: Dr. Edmund A. Cassella, Dr. Bruce Donoff, Dr. Daniel A. Hammer, Dr. Uri Hangorsky, Dr. Willis Stanton Hardesty Jr., Dr. Jennifer Korzeb, Dr. Steven M. Lepowsky, Dr. Jun S. Lim, Dr. Maurice S. 10 Miles, Dr. David L. Nielson, Dr. Linda C. Niessen, Dr. Jacqueline Plemons and Dr. Donna Thomas-11 12 Moses were present. Dr. David Boden and Dr. GeriAnn DiFranco were unable to participate in the call. 13 Dr. Raymond A. Cohlmia, ADA Board Liaison to the Council, and Dr. Roopali Kulkarni, the American 14 Student Dental Association representative, were unable to join the call. 15 16 17 The following ADA staff members attended the meeting: Mr. Thomas Elliott, Deputy General Counsel 18 and Director, Council on Ethics, Bylaws and Judicial Affairs Ms. Karen M. Hart, Director, Council on Dental Education and Licensure, Ms. Annette Puzan, Manager, Dental Education and Licensure, Dr. 19 Meaghan Strotman, Manager, Dental Licensure and Education and Dr. Anthony J. Ziebert, Senior Vice-20 President, Education and Professional Affairs. 21 22 23 Adoption of Agenda, Disclosure of Business or Personal Relationships, and ADA Professional **Conduct Policy:** The Council approved the agenda. Dr. Gehani directed the Council's attention to the 24 25 ADA Disclosure Policy. No personal, professional or business relationships were disclosed. Consent Calendar: A consent calendar was prepared to expedite the business of the Council. Dr. 26 27 Gehani reminded Council members that any report, recommendation or resolution could be removed 28 from the consent calendar for discussion. The following reports in their entirety were placed on the consent calendar and adopted as received: 29 30 31 Committee Assignments for 2019-2020 32 33 Committee Meeting Dates 34 35 CDEL Meeting January 16-17, 2020 36 ADA Meeting Attendance Chart: Dr. Gehani asked Council members to confirm their attendance at 37 38 the 2019 ADA Dental Meeting and whether they would be serving as a delegate or alternate. Additionally, the members noted whether they would attend the Hearing of the Reference Committee 39 40 on Dental Education, Science and Related Matters on Saturday, September 8, 2019. 41 House on Delegates Schedule: The Council reviewed the House of Delegates and Related Activities 42 Preliminary Schedule. Dr. Cassella urged Council members attending as delegates to register to vote 43 prior to Election Day, Monday September, 9, 2019. 44 45 CDEL Annual Report to the 2019 House of Delegates: Dr. Gehani asked the Council to become 46 familiar with the Council's 2019 Annual Report. Dr. Cassella noticed an error in Table 1. Recent 47 48 Enacted State Licensure Legislation provided by the department of State Government Affairs, wherein they reported the state of Hawaii "Increase[d] the number of dental CE ethics hours required from at 49

50 least three credits every year to at least six credits every two years." He informed the Council that

1 Hawaii amended the timeline for earning at least six credits to the discretion of the dental professional every two years, rather than three continuing education units annually. Ms. Hart indicated that she 2 3 would work with staff to correct the report if possible.

4 5 CDEL-Related Resolutions with Recommended Assignments: Dr. Gehani led a discussion on resolutions related to the Council's areas of responsibility. Resolutions 17-25 call for amendment to the 6 7 ADA Bylaws and Governance Manual for the Commission on Dental Accreditation, Joint Commission 8 on National Dental Examinations, Commission on Recognition of Dental Specialties and Certifying 9 Boards and the Commission for Recognition of Continuing Education Providers. The Council agreed with the Board of Trustees that the governance practices among the Commissions should reflect best 10 practices, be streamlined and consistent. The Council concluded that the changes proposed in 11 12 Resolutions 17-25 will align the governance practices for the commissions and decrease some of the needless complexities within the Association's governance structure for members and staff. 13

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Action: The Council voted to support Board Report 5 and Resolutions 17-25 at the Hearing of the Reference Committee on Dental Education, Science and Related Matters.

17 The Council also reviewed the four resolutions it transmitted to the 2019 ADA House of Delegates 18 (Resolution 66 calling for amendment of the policy for the criteria for recognition of a certification board 19 20 for dental assistants, Resolution 67 calling for amendment of the policy for the criteria for recognition of 21 a certification board for dental laboratory technicians, Resolution 68 urging recession of the policy on admissions criteria for dental hygiene programs, and Resolution 69 recommending the findings of the 22 23 study regarding the feasibility accreditation of advanced education programs in geriatric dentistry be provided to the Specialty Care Dentistry Association). Council members planning to attend the House 24 of Delegates Meeting agreed on a plan to provide testimony in support of these resolutions at the 25 Dental Education, Science and Related Matters Reference Committee Hearing. 26

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28 The Council then reviewed several other resolutions related to the Council's areas of responsibility which will be considered by the Reference Committee on Legislative, Health, Governance and Related 29 Matters. The Council collaborated with the Council on Ethics, Bylaws and Judicial Affairs this year on 30 31 reconsideration of the policy, Use of the Term "Specialty." The Council reviewed CEBJA's Resolution 70: Report on the Referral of Resolution 21H-2018: Amendment of Policy: Use of the Term "Specialty" 32 33 and fully supported amendment of the policy as reflected in Resolution 70. The Council agreed that these changes will recognize the role of the National Commission on Recognition of Dental Specialties 34 and Certifying Boards and that jurisdictions may use means other than reliance on the National 35 36 Commission on Recognition in allowing practitioners to announce as specialists within their borders. 37 Council members agreed to provide testimony in support of this resolution at the Hearing. 38

39 The Council also collaborated with the Council on Government Affairs this year on the review and revision of a number of outdated policy statements into new statements which succinctly reflect the 40 Association's current efforts and positions related to Federal student loan programs. At its June 2019 41 meeting, the Council agreed to support Resolution 36: Proposed Policy - Federal Student Loan 42 Programs, Resolution 37: Proposed Policy - Federal Student Loan Repayment Incentives, Resolution 43 38: Proposed Policy - Tax Treatment of Student Loan Interest, Scholarships and Stipends and 44 Resolution 39: Proposed Policy - General, Pediatric and Public Health Dental Residency Programs. 45 Council members agreed to provide testimony is support of these resolutions at the Hearing. 46

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Finally, the Council reviewed Resolutions 14 and 15 calling for simplification of membership dues. The 48 49 Council considered these as informational and took no action.

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CODA Standards Hearing in San Francisco: The Council was reminded of the Commission on 51

52 Dental Accreditation's Standards Hearing to be held during the ADA Meeting. Council members were America's leading advocate for oral health
