Dear Majority Leader McConnell and Senator Kaine:

On behalf of our 163,000 member dentists, we are writing to express our enthusiastic support for S. 1541, the Tobacco-Free Youth Act. This legislation would increase the legal age to purchase tobacco products from 18 to 21 years old and is critical in addressing our current youth tobacco epidemic.

Preventing oral cancer and other tobacco-related diseases have been a longstanding priority for the ADA. About 9 out of 10 people who die from oral and pharyngeal cancers use tobacco, and the risk of developing these cancers is related to how much (and how often) they use. On average, 40 percent of those with the disease will not survive more than 5 years. Tobacco products are also causally associated with higher rates of gum disease, periodontal disease, mucosal lesions, bone damage, tooth loss, jaw bone loss and more.

S. 1541 would help prevent tobacco use among our youth by raising the national age to legally purchase tobacco products from 18 to 21 years old. It would help reduce the number of young people who begin smoking before age 21, which represents 95 percent of current adult smokers.

Moreover, the bill would apply to the more than 3.6 million middle and high school students who are e-cigarette users. Research shows that young people who use e-cigarettes are more likely to transition to smoking cigarettes. For that reason, the ADA does not consider these non-traditional tobacco products to be safer (or less harmful) alternatives to smoking.

Increasing the tobacco sale age from 18 to 21 will not stop our youth from seeking out tobacco products, but is important step in that direction.
