Code Maintenance Committee (CMC)
Composition, Responsibilities and Meeting Protocol

Effective: November 13, 2024

Notes: This publication documents the Code Maintenance Committee’s role in maintaining the ADA intellectual property known as the *Code on Dental Procedures and Nomenclature* (CDT Code). Content updates will be made as needed to ensure that this purpose is achieved.

All materials concerning CDT Code maintenance are maintained and stored by the ADA as the CMC Secretariat.

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1 **1.0 INTRODUCTION**

2 PL 104-191, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA), was enacted on
3 August 21, 1996. The Secretary, Health and Human Services, under the law's Administrative
4 Simplification provisions, published the final rule on HIPAA standard transactions and code sets in the
5 August 17, 2000, Federal Register. This rule addressed changes to 45CFR Parts 160 and 162, which
6 established standards for electronic health care transactions and code sets used in these transactions.
7 According to the regulatory text:

- 8 • 162.1002 Medical Data Code Sets – The Secretary adopts the following code set maintaining
9 organization's code sets as the standard data code sets:
 - 10 ○ (d) *Code on Dental Procedures and Nomenclature*, as maintained and distributed by the
11 American Dental Association, for dental services.

12 The purpose of the CDT Code is to achieve uniformity, consistency and specificity in accurately
13 recording and reporting dental treatment. One use of the CDT Code is to provide for the efficient
14 processing of dental claims, and another is to populate an Electronic Health Record. The dental
15 profession has been using the CDT Code since 1969 to report dental procedures for a variety of
16 reasons and is therefore familiar with this code set. The CDT Code satisfies the dual aims of
17 profession-wide standardization in reporting, and the administrative simplification that stems from a
18 universally recognized taxonomy.

19 The Code Maintenance Committee (CMC) is a standing committee of the ADA's Council on Dental
20 Benefit Programs (CDBP) This committee:

- 21 • Enables the Council to fulfill its ADA Governance and Organization Manual responsibility
- 22 • Has broad representation from the dental community in accordance with ADA policy
- 23 • Follows protocols that are in accordance with requirements for the maintenance of named HIPAA
24 medical code sets
- 25 • Is chaired by a current or past Council member

26 **2.0 SCOPE OF CMC RESPONSIBILITIES**

27 The CMC is responsible for maintaining the narrative components of a CDT code entry – 1) the
28 required "Nomenclature," the written title of a Procedure Code; and 2) the optional "Descriptor," a
29 written narrative that further defines the nature and intended use of a single Procedure Code To fulfill
30 this responsibility the CMC:

- 31 1. Determines what action to take on all substantive and editorial action requests concerning
32 individual CDT code content (e.g., addition of new; revision to existing; deletion of existing).
- 33 2. Initiates and make decisions on its own CDT Code action requests.
- 34 3. Suggests the location (e.g., Category of Service) where CDT Code additions would be placed.

35 **3.0 COMMITTEE COMPOSITION**

36 The Code Maintenance Committee is comprised of organizations (i.e., legal entities) in the categories
37 listed within this section. There are no individual (i.e., natural person) members.

- 38 • American Dental Association (5 representatives, one of whom will serve as CMC chair)
- 39 • Dental specialty organizations (e.g., those recognized by the "National Commission on
40 Recognition of Dental Specialties and Certifying Boards" – 1 representative each)

- 1 • Dental professional organizations representing practitioners and dental educators (1
2 representative each)
- 3 • Third-party payer and dental benefits organizations (1 representative each)

4 Appendix 1 contains the list of current CMC member organizations.

5 Appendix 2 describes the process to be followed by organizations that seek to become CMC members.

6 Appendix 3 outlines the requirements for and policy concerning ongoing CMC membership.

7 **4.0 MEMBER ORGANIZATION OBLIGATIONS**

8 A CMC member organization:

- 9 • Appoints, at its full discretion, the individual who will represent its interests and exercise the
10 organization's vote during the committee's meetings.
 - 11 ○ Representatives are not subject to ratification by the CMC or other entity before being
12 seated.
 - 13 ○ Member organizations may appoint their representative on a continuing or meeting-by-
14 meeting basis, or ad-hoc during a meeting, to ensure that all member organizations
15 present are able to cast their ballot.
- 16 • Names the individual(s), which may include staff, to whom all CMC related materials and
17 information will be conveyed.
- 18 • Is responsible for all expenses, individual and otherwise, incurred in their CDT Code maintenance
19 activities.
- 20 • Is responsible for educating its representatives on the CMC's processes as described in this
21 document.
- 22 • Is expected to review and discuss all CDT Code Action Requests within their constituency prior to
23 the CMC's annual meeting.
- 24 • Must ensure that its representative is present to engage in discussion and cast a vote on all
25 business that comes before the committee.

26 Appendix 3 describes the process to be followed when a member organization does not fulfill its
27 membership obligations.

28 **5.0 MEETINGS**

29 5.1 Annual (In-Person)

30 The CMC annual business meeting is the scheduled event during which the committee determines
31 which of the substantive and editorial action requests will be included in the CDT Code's next version.
32 Meetings convene during the 1st quarter of each calendar year at ADA Headquarters in Chicago on
33 dates that present minimal conflict with other major dental events. Each annual CMC meeting is
34 scheduled to be in session for two consecutive days, a Thursday and Friday. Early adjournment is
35 possible, and dependent on time needed to complete committee discussion and action on all agenda
36 items.

37 **Note:** Under special circumstances virtual participation by member organization representatives or staff
38 may be accommodated. However, a member organization must be represented in-person to cast
39 a vote on any business before the committee.

1 5.2 Conference Calls

2 The CMC may convene by conference call when an urgent matter is identified for discussion by all
3 member organizations.

4 **6.0 CMC CHAIR**

5 This individual is named by the Council on Dental Benefit Programs and is also a voting member
6 representing the ADA. The Chair:

- 7 • Determines the agenda for all CMC meetings
- 8 • Participates in discussion of action requests and other matters addressed by the CMC
- 9 • Must cast a vote as an ADA representative on motions to accept a CDT Code Action Request,
10 and on other matters that come to ballot
- 11 • Performs other administrative functions as required to complete CMC meeting work in a timely
12 and efficient manner
- 13 • May establish ad-hoc working groups when needed to support CMC work
- 14 • When absent, she or he may designate another ADA representative to serve as the Temporary
15 Chair, with the same responsibilities

16 **7.0 SECRETARIAT**

17 ADA staff serve as the CMC Secretariat that is responsible for:

- 18 • Process Administration – Includes: meeting and conference call arrangements; preparation and
19 distribution of meeting notices, action request submissions, agenda and other discussion
20 material, and action reports; records maintenance; form creation and update (e.g., Action
21 Requests; Summary Reports).
- 22 • Action Request “Triage” – Includes: identification of required information errors or omissions so
23 that only submissions that adhere to the submission and evaluation guidelines, as specified in the
24 Preface of the CDT Code Action Request form’s most current version, are conveyed to the CMC
25 for consideration. The most current version of the request form is posted on the ADA’s CDT
26 Code internet site (www.ada.org/cdt) – [Request to Change to the Code | American Dental
27 Association \(ada.org\)](http://www.ada.org/cdt).

28 **Note:** Secretariat “triage” is performed on all action requests, substantive and editorial –

- 29 1. Received by the November closing date for submissions.
- 30 2. During the CMC meeting before the CMC Chair calls for a vote on:
 - 31 a. Received requests that the CMC has amended.
 - 32 b. New requests initiated by a CMC member organization.
- 33 • CDT Code Maintenance Portal Updates (<http://www.ada.org/en/publications/cdt/> or
34 www.ada.org/cdt) Includes: information on CMC meetings; action request inventories; reports of
35 CMC decisions on requested actions.

36 **8.0 VOTING**

37 CMC business items will be addressed in accordance with the meeting agenda as adopted by the
38 committee, and in accordance with the following protocols.

39 8.1. General

- 40 • A simple majority of CMC member organizations present shall constitute a quorum for conducting
41 business

- 1 • All motions on CDT Code actions must be worded in the affirmative (e.g., Move to accept
- 2 substantive inventory item # 99 as submitted.)
- 3 • CMC member organizations represented at the meeting must vote Yea, Nay, or Abstain on
- 4 motions to accept a CDT Code action, or other committee business
- 5 • The member organization representative must be present to cast a vote
- 6 • No proxy votes are permitted
- 7 • A simple majority of the member organizations present and voting will determine the outcome of a
- 8 motion to accept an action request, or for other committee business as needed
- 9 • Abstentions do not count when the majority is determined
- 10 • The Chair determines how votes are to be cast during a meeting (e.g., vote cards; raised hands).
- 11 • A tie vote means the motion or requested action is not accepted
- 12 • A motion to reconsider may be entertained prior to the adjournment of the meeting when a CMC
- 13 member wishes to discuss an action taken during the meeting

14 8.2. Editorial Actions (See 9.4 for definition of an editorial action)

- 15 • These actions are presented as part of the meeting's consent calendar
- 16 • Any CMC member organization may request one or more editorial actions be removed from the
- 17 consent calendar and be addressed individually

18 8.3. Substantive Actions (See 9.3 for definition of a substantive action)

- 19 • These actions are addressed in the order presented on the Substantive Inventory, or in groups of
- 20 similar or related requests when determined by the Chair
- 21 • A separate motion to accept each substantive request is required
- 22 • A single motion to accept a group of similar or related requests is permissible when determined
- 23 by the Chair

24 8.4. Rationales for CDT Code Action Request Vote Outcome

- 25 • The CMC will review the Secretariat's draft rationale for declining a request prior to release of a
- 26 meeting's final action report.
- 27 • Unless decided otherwise by the Secretariat, no rationale is needed for accepted requests as the
- 28 presumption is the submitter's rationale is considered persuasive

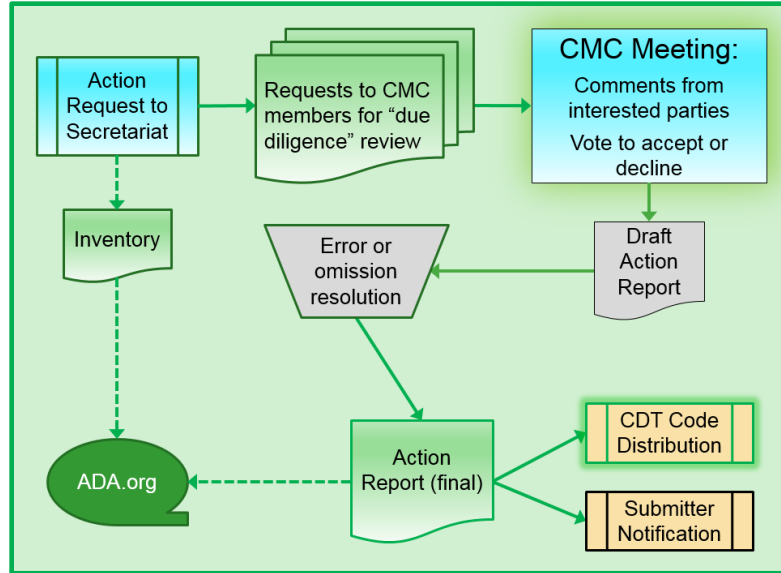
29 **9.0 CDT CODE MAINTENANCE PROCESS – OVERVIEW**

30 The Council has created a CDT Code maintenance process that incorporates the best practices of
31 processes established by other organizations (e.g., AMA for CPT) that maintain HIPAA named medical
32 code sets. The CDT's process was presented to the National Committee on Vital and Health Statistics,
33 the federal agency with HIPAA implementation oversight, in June 2012.

34 NCVHS, during its hearing, favorably accepted the ADA testimony and responses to questions, and
35 acknowledged that the Council's process has the openness and broad participation sought by HIPAA
36 regulations.

37 9.1. Flowchart

38 Key features of the CDT Code maintenance process are in the following illustration.



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9.2. Timeline

Process milestones leading to a new CDT Code version are listed in this sample timeline for a future version.

5 9.3. Substantive Action Request

1 A substantive CDT Code action is one that results in either a new CDT Code entry, complete deletion of
 2 a CDT Code entry, or revision to any part of a CDT Code entry. A substantive Revision affects the
 3 nature and scope of a current CDT Code entry.

4 Any individual or organization may submit a substantive action request for consideration, and the
 5 request must be on the specified form posted on-line at: [http://www.ada.org/en/publications/cdt/request-](http://www.ada.org/en/publications/cdt/request-to-change-to-the-code)
 6 [to-change-to-the-code](http://www.ada.org/en/publications/cdt/request-to-change-to-the-code). Supporting information may be included, accompanied by a written permission
 7 to reproduce and distribute for matter protected by copyright.

8 **9.4. Editorial Action Request**

9 An editorial CDT Code action is one that addresses grammatical and syntax errors, or other corrections
 10 that in the submitter’s opinion do not affect the nature and scope of the CDT Code entry. Only CMC
 11 member organizations may submit an editorial action.

12 The Editorial change process features a short form action request (illustration following) with CMC
 13 adoption by Consent Calendar as noted in the “VOTING” provisions in section 8.2 above.

14 **9.5. Action Report**

15 Action Reports record final decisions on all submissions addressed during the meeting. Report drafts,
 16 which include rationales for actions prepared by the Secretariat based on meeting discussion, are
 17 circulated via electronic means for CMC member organization review and ratification. When in final
 18 form the Substantive Action Report and the Editorial Action Report are distributed to all CMC member
 19 organizations. A separate Summary Action Report is posted on ADA.org for public information

20 **9.6. Submission for Reconsideration**

21 Declined requests may be resubmitted, with new information identified, for consideration during the next
 22 (or later as determined by the submitter) review and revision cycle.

23 **10.0 CDT CODE ACTION REQUEST SUBMISSION AND EVALUATION GUIDELINES**

24 These guidelines are in the Preface of CDT Code Action Request form’s most current version, which is
 25 posted on the ADA’s CDT Code internet site (www.ada.org/cdt) – [Request to Change to the Code |](#)
 26 [American Dental Association \(ada.org\)](http://www.ada.org). The Code Maintenance Committee member organization must
 27 incorporate these guidelines, in conjunction with information on a request form (e.g., rationale for the
 28 addition, revision or deletion), in determining their position when the CMC votes to accept or reject an
 29 action request.

30 **11.0 AD-HOC WORKING GROUPS**

1 Working groups may be formed by the Chair to expedite the CMC's work. Scope and deliverables are
2 established when the ad-hoc body is established. A working group dissolves upon preparation of its
3 deliverables.

4 **12.0 NON-MEMBER (OBSERVER) PROTOCOL**

5 The CMC meeting is open to any person interested in the proceedings to observe the process and
6 listen to discussions. Observers are not CMC members but may have an interest in one or more of the
7 CDT Code Action Requests on the meeting agenda.

8 Such individuals may not disturb the proceedings by interacting with any CMC member organization
9 representative or staff. Any such individual interaction may only occur during a break in the proceedings
10 called by the Chair.

11 When recognized by the Chair, any interested party may comment on a CDT Code action request being
12 discussed by the CMC.

13 a. Interested parties are asked to make their comments at the time an action item is being
14 addressed by the committee. Such comments are an integral component of the meeting's
15 proceedings; there is no separate period solely for observers to voice their views on any
16 action request. The Chair may also ask observers to address specific committee
17 questions, as needed.

18 **13.0 PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES**

19 *The American Institute of Parliamentarians Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure* is used to
20 expedite due process on matters not addressed by this document.

1 Appendix 1 – CMC Member Organizations

1 Appendix 3 – CMC Member Organization Ongoing Participation Requirements

2 All CMC member organizations are expected to fulfill their membership obligations and attend
3 committee meetings. The following policy applies when any member organization is not present to vote
4 at a CMC meeting.

5 Any CMC member organization absent from at least one official CMC meeting
6 following two independent attempts by the ADA Secretariat to invite the designated
7 representative shall forfeit their voting representation on the CMC.

8 Written notification of the forfeit will be sent on ADA letterhead, signed by the Council on Dental
9 Benefit Programs chair and transmitted both electronically and by US Postal Service mail.

10 A member organization that forfeits its voting representation must request membership in
11 accordance with the “Requests for Membership” process described in Appendix 2.
