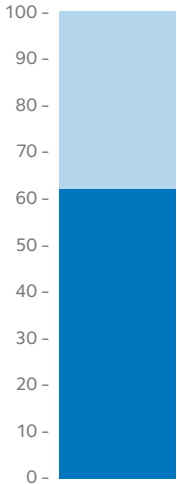


International Students in U.S. Dental Schools



INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS IN U.S. DENTAL SCHOOLS
 In 2018-19, 62% of U.S. dental schools (41 of 66) offered an advanced standing program for graduates of international dental schools. This percentage is nearly identical to 1985-86, when 36 out of 60 schools (60%) offered this type of program.

627 INTERNATIONAL DENTAL SCHOOL GRADUATES WERE ADMITTED WITH ADVANCED STANDING IN 2018-19. More than two of every three were admitted in the 3rd year of the program.

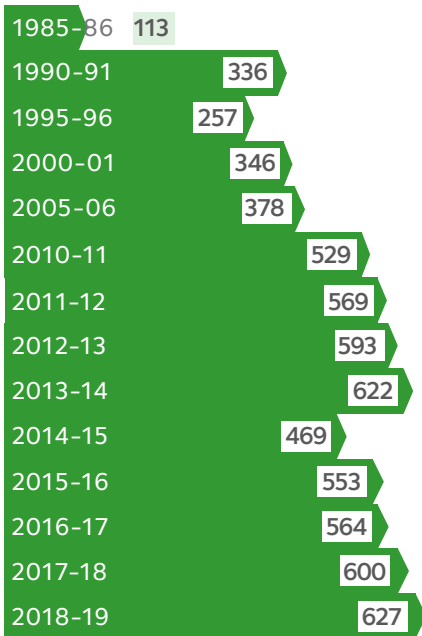
SECOND YEAR

THE NUMBER OF INTERNATIONAL DENTAL SCHOOL GRADUATES admitted to U.S. dental schools has generally increased since 1985. However, a substantial decrease occurred between 2013-14 and 2014-15, due largely to the phase out of an advanced standing program that admitted more than 120 international grads per year. In 2018-19, the number of international grads reached an all-time high.
